ALPS Reports include the following measures:

- Overall value added measures shows the overall performance of the Sixth Form against a national dataset.
- Individual student achievement shows the performance of each student and compares this to a target grade based on what is happening nationally. This is useful in formative target setting.

• Quality of teaching and learning - shows the percentage of students that achieve the ALPS targets and the overall quality of teaching and learning in the Sixth Form.

The majority of students may be considering Higher Education as their next steps after Sixth Form. Each grade at A Level provides UCAS points for students.
