Students can develop their skills in a range of theatrical disciplines with the emphasis on acting and directing.

Studying Drama as a separate specialism enables students to progress to higher education, whether in the area of the arts or in a host of other subjects. Former students have gone on to study at leading establishments including LIPA and RADA.

St Julie's is a unique partner school with The Liverpool Everyman and Playhouse, which gives students opportunities to work with leading actors, companies and directors. Students are entered for a range of festivals and auditions and have been most successful. Community work proves to be a rewarding and challenging aspect of the course.

## A Level: Drama Performing Arts

In Drama and Theatre Studies, students learn how performers, designers and directors communicate meaning to an audience. It is essential to learn how to work creatively to produce practical work of a high standard.

Students will see a wide range of live theatre throughout the course to develop their ability to make judgements.

A GCSE in Drama is not an entry requirement; at the same it must be emphasised that students should display evidence of their practical ability and dedication.

## Component 1: Drama and theatre (40% of A Level)

- This is the written examination which consists of:
- Knowledge and understanding of drama and theatre.
- Study of two set plays
- Analysis and evaluation of the work of live theatre makers. Written exam: 3 hours • Open book • 80 marks

## Component 2: Creating original drama (30% of A Level)

This is a practical examination which consists of:

- Process of creating devised drama.
- Performance of devised drama.
- Devised piece must be influenced by the work and methodologies of one prescribed practitioner.

Working notebook (40 marks) • Devised performance (20 marks) • 60 marks in total = 30% of A-level

## Component 3: Making theatre (30% of A level)

This is a practical examination which consists of:

- Practical exploration and interpretation of three extracts each taken from a different play.
- Methodology of a prescribed practitioner must be applied to Extract 3 and performed for assessment.
- Reflective report analysing and evaluating theatrical interpretation of all three extracts.

Performance of Extract 3 (40 marks) • Reflective report (20 marks) • 60 marks in total
