Welcome back to a new academic vear. Whilst it has been the summer holidays we have not all been resting A group of

staff led 7 students on a 4 week expedition to Peru. The trek to Machu Pichu took 5 days and was followed by sheer hard work, making clay bricks in the midday sun to build classrooms and toilet blocks for a remote school community. However, the students thoroughly enjoyed the challenge, as can be seen on our website.

Once again we celebrate fantastic results across the school. Another year of pleasing Sixth Form results saw over 70% of all A Level grades at A*-C, with students leaving us to go to University in Liverpool, Manchester, Newcastle and Queens College, Cambridge. Results at GCSE were equally solid. As schools across the city and country reported a drop in GCSE results, particularly in Maths, we continued to perform well, with headline results equal to last year and a slight increase in Maths results by 1%. Particularly pleasing was the increase in A*/A grades, especially in English and RE where nearly one third of all grades were at A*/A grade level for Year 11 students.

I am also pleased to report that we have come to the end of a very long period of consultation with the community about a new school building for St Julie's. At an open public meeting on 10 September Mayor Joe Anderson listened to the views of all members of the local community and committed to move forward to a detailed planning application. The proposal is for the new school to be built mainly on its current site, with a small slice of land taken from the field in front of the school. The Mayor went on to say he would seek to replace any lost land with woodland, gained from the Trustees of the school, adjacent to the field. If the planning application is successful the Mayor stated that he would want the work to commence in the summer term, after exams have

The future is looking very bright, with continued exam success and proposed new school buildings. St Julie's continues to be the school of choice for girls in South Liverpool, and for good reason. Students Make a Trip of a Lifetime



During the Summer a group of students embarked on an epic trip to Peru for 4 weeks, joining with Sawston College from Cambridge.

Cusco City was the first stop on this adventure. A few days sightseeing was had in order to acclimatise to the altitude. The group then went to Camp Cusco to help the local community there build a stone wall enclosure around their school. Next for the group was the Salkantay Trek to Machu Pichu.

This was a 5 day trek, which covered 52 miles of high altitude and a walk through the Amazon Rainforest. It was difficult, but worth it when they got to see the



magnificent Incan Ruins.

The group then made their way to Lake Titicaca to aid in the construction of two toilet blocks for the local community. A week of intense physical work resulted in the buildings being made from adobe mud bricks. A day off allowed the group to venture to the world famous floating reed islands.



The group then transferred to Colca Canyon, the second deepest canyon in the world.

Projects undertaken in Colca included restoring the library in the secondary school, building a drainage system in the kindergarten and building a kitchen to provide meals for the local children.

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
