

## Progression...guiding you in securing the right destination post-16

Application window	Deadline	Likelihood of acceptance	Views used to inform curriculum offer/option blocks?
First wave	15th February 2019	High likelihood of conditional offer based on meeting Governors' Academic and Pastoral Entry Criteria	Yes – chance to identify clashes and/or request additional subjects
Second wave	22nd August 2019	Moderate chance of acceptance - dependent on availability of places - priority given to first wave applicant - and meeting Governors' Academic and Pastoral Entry Criteria	No
Third wave	30 <sup>th</sup> September 2019	Low chance of acceptance dependent on availability of places and meeting Governors' Academic and Pastoral Entry Criteria	No

### **Your Programme of Study**

Minimum\* of 3x A Levels/Level 3 BTECs plus:

- 1 lesson per week of Core Religious Education
- 1 week of work experience
- PSHE/Form Time
- Christian Action (Year 12 only)
- Any other element as directed by the KS5 Team (e.g. Supervised Study)

GCSE English and GCSE Maths will continue to be studied by any students who do not achieve a Grade 4\*\* or above on entry into Sixth Form

\*\*Some university courses may require Grade 5 in GCSE English and/or Maths



### **Option Block Structures**

There are four blocks and students can choose one course in each.

Blocks are arranged to provide maximum potential for students to access the course combinations that they want.

We also try to maintain as much flexibility as possible in our blocking arrangements to meet the demands of our students.

### 2019 Provisional Option Blocks

The option block structure below shows how the courses fit together to form the curriculum. Most students will study 3 A Level or Level 3 BTEC courses. You can choose only one course from each of blocks A, B, C or D and you do not have to choose a course from every block. Block E is comprised of other core elements of students' programme study - Christian Action and Core RE are compulsory for all students and GCSE English and Maths for those who did not get Grade 4 or above in Year 11. This structure is provisional, and all course provision is subject to demand and not guaranteed to run. Option blocks from our collaborative partners will be published shortly.

Our NEET figures are well below local and national average; showing that our Sixth Form students receive personalised support to help them reach their goals – either at university, on an apprenticeship or within employment

### Results - past seven consecutive years

Achieved minimum A Level pass rate of 90% at grades A\*-E; 100% pass rate for Level 3 BTEC

Over the last four years, our 'Value Added' score (key DfE measure for ranking post 16 provision) is incredibly positive – our students' progress is at least in line with peers nationally

Many of our courses and qualifications have been ranked in the top 25% and top 10% nationally



## Ofsted: An independent view

### **Student and Parent Voice: Real Opinions**

98% of students agreed that they are satisfied with the facilities on offer to Sixth Form students

97% of students agreed that the quality of teaching they receive is good or better.

100% of students agreed that the Sixth Form is well led and managed because staff listen to their views

**100%** of parents agreed that their daughter/son is **happy** in Sixth Form; makes good progress; is taught well; and has been well supported in their university/apprenticeship/job application
